**Laclede County Health Department Announces  
42 New Laboratory Confirmed Positive COVID-19 Case(s)  
Reported 07/20/2021**

**Case #4084 - #4125**

LACLEDE COUNTY, MO – The Laclede County Health Department has received notification of forty-two (42) additional positive laboratory confirmed case(s) of COVID-19 in Laclede County. Our total is now four-thousand-one-hundred-twenty-four (4124) cases to date; two-hundred-seventy-one (271) currently being monitored, three-thousand-seven-hundred-seventy-seven (3777) considered recovered, seventy-six (76) deaths, and multiple close contacts being monitored daily. Our agency will not be releasing personal information, to protect the individuals' identity. Recommended notification and testing of identified close contacts, and quarantine/isolation instructions have been provided. Monitoring of active cases and close contacts will be completed for the quarantine/isolation period, as appropriate.

**Vaccination Status of Cases #4084 - #4125**
